


## NBOYS TOO TERRIBLE TO TELL!

Funny Animal Artist Profiles: Jim Engel

This is part two of an ongoing series where I profile my favorite funny animal artists. ("Tip o' the Hat to the Kaz Man" was part 1.) Today: Jim Engel, professional toy designer and good friend. Jim reads Fanboy on a regular basis, and has fired back some his own ideas at me on the subject of the new Disney show "Quack Pack".

So why start with Jim Engel? It's the least I can do after all his support. It still jars my mind that a pro in the comics industry could enjoy

something as amateurish and spur-of-the moment as Fanboy.

Plus, with Jim's help, I've managed to acquire almost all of the comics he's done, so I've got a pretty good cross section of his stuff for reference. As Jim once joked at the Chicago Con, "Yeah, I've done some comic book projects. David's probably the only guy in the entire building who can name 'em all."

Jim's been a professional cartoonist since 1975, if I've gotten my facts right. Give or take a year. I'm not sure. One of Jim's first art jobs was as a greeting card artist for a card company in Chicago called Mark I.

Jim's first comic strip was Dick Duck, Duck Dick, which apppeared in a fanzine/trade journal called The Comic Reader. (Tom and Rob were Comic Reader junkies. I've bought about five dozen issues from their back issue box.) Atong with Dick Duck, he created Fandom Confidential with fellow TCR staffer Chuck Fiala (Bullet Crow, Tiny Toons, etc...). FC was a photo comic, only it didn't suck like most photo comics. It often has me laughing out loud no matter how many times I've reread it. My favorite episode is a "Stan's Soapbox" thing they did where Jim put on sunglasses and a bad toupee and pretended to be Stan Lee. Dick Duck ended in early 1982. According to Jim, "Home and work life at that point was hectic enough to make doing even a one-pager in my spare time difficult" A very old Dick Duck story eventually saw print in Eb'nn the Raven no. 6 (1987).

Also on Mr. Engel's resume is an attempt at newspaper syndication In 1986- a comic strip called Buttons which was a sort of domestic remake of Dick Duck, reminiscent of Mort Walker and Walt Kelly at the same time, with a hint of Jim's past gag strips such as Pals and Hi and Sy, Those Goofy Geezers. (Eric Rasmussen loves Hi and Sy. I'll have to get him to do a top ten list on it...) The strip was rejected. As it was explained by Jim in Amazing Heroes no. 129, "I made my first attempt at getting syndicated, and did so with an all animal cast. I did it knowing ahead of time that editors had an aversion to them. I HAD to do it that way, because if it had flown I'd be faced with DOING it. So it hadda be animals." Jim's drawings people are good (he can crank out Spiley in 3 seconds flat), but he simply enjoys funny animals more. I feel the same way, which is one of the reasons I quit doing "Dave's World" for the Lead Telegram. I just can't work with an all-human cast.

Fortunately, such setbacks haven't kept Jim out of the papers. He has been known to draw the Mickey Mouse newspaper strip from time to time.

Let's see, what else has Engel done...? Oh yeah, he did three strips for Critters, Leggo Lamb, A Night at the Beanery, and Cat 'n' Dog. He also drew comic book covers for the Terrytoons and Underdog comics when they were being published by Spotlight. All too often I've been tricked into buying a mediocre Mighty Mouse comic under a brilliant Engel cover. Only the covers of Daan Jippes and Walt Kelly have that same sort of sales-grabbing charm. In addition, Jim Drew stuff for the Radio Boy comic, something called Pernod and Balboaras a back-up feature in Usagi Yojimbo, and worked with TCR guys Chuck Fiala and Mike Tiefenbacher on the excellent Funny Stuff Stocking stuffer for DC Comics

He currently works for Simon Marketing where he designs Happy Med Toys (Remember that commemorative Happy Meal Train with all the different characters? That's one of Jim's.) and does promotional art of characters like the Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles, The Muppet Babies, and Rocky and Bullwinkle.




